# **Biographical Information**

Lee Ella (Lella) Warren was born March 22, 1899, in Clayton, Alabama, where her family lived until 1901. Her parents were Lee Ella Underwood and Dr. Benjamin Smart Warren. Dr. Warren served as an official with the

U.S. Marine Hospital Service and was instrumental in the formation of the U.S. Public Health Service.

After her second birthday, the family moved from Clayton as Dr. Warren received assignments from the Marine Hospital Service. Warren spent a part of her childhood growing up on military bases in the east and midwest (including Milwaukee and St. Louis) before Dr. Warren was assigned to Washington, D.C.. Growing up in the capitol city, Warren graduated in 1917 from the District's Western High School, where her literary efforts attracted the attention of Margaret Bell Merrill, a creative writing teacher. Merrill, impressed with Warren's skill, sent one of her short stories to William Rose Benet, an editor for Century Magazine. Benet's response to the story, "Red Brick," was supportive and undoubtedly encouraged Warren in making a career of writing.

Warren began college at George Washington University in 1917. Her sophomore year she transferred to Goucher College but returned to George Washington to complete her junior and senior years and receive her A.B. degree in 1921. Following her graduation, she married John Spanogle, whom she met through her brother. In 1923, Warren gave birth to her daughter Lee. Warren's interest in writing continued following her marriage. Working on a short story written in college, she expanded the work into her first novel, A Touch of Earth, which was published in 1926. The novel, like a great deal of Warren's works, is somewhat autobiographical. The novel served as a springboard for Warren, who, during the late twenties and into the thirties, began selling short stories to magazines such as Cosmopolitan, Good Housekeeping, McClure's, Collier's, and College Humor. In 1930, she divorced Spanogle and worked in a variety of jobs in journalism, in public relations, and in government offices to support her and her daughter. 1

In 1936, Warren married Gerald Breckenridge, a journalist who served as a city editor for the New York Telegram before leaving in 1930. He also served in the publicity department of R.K.O. studios until the end of the Second World War. Breckenridge provided advice and support to Warren

She also continued research on what would be her opus as a writer, her

novel Foundation Stone.

as she worked on Foundation Stone during this period. The novel was derived from the Warren family history following the family's arrival in Alabama in the 1820's. In spite of suffering a serious, unidentified illness during the thirties, Warren's work progressed. While her work was progressing, her marriage to Breckenridge was not. The two were divorced in 1940. In September of that year, Foundation Stone became Warren's second published novel and was dedicated to her father, who had died in 1935. While Warren recognized Breckenridge for his contributions to the work, relations between the two apparently declined. In later interviews and in biographical information prepared later by Warren, she failed to mention her marriage to Breckenridge.

Interest in Foundation Stone grew rapidly. Prior to its publication in trade form, Foundation Stone was chosen by Alfred Knopf as a Borzoi Book. A special limited edition of the novel was printed and distributed to the Friends of the Borzoi. By mid-October, Foundation Stone was second only to Mrs. Miniver on the Herald-Tribune's best-sellers list. As a result of the interest in the novel, Warren was selected as a woman of the year by the Women's National Press Club in 1941. In August of that year, Warren was married for the final time, to Buel W. "Dan" Patch.

Following her marriage, Warren continued with her writing. In 1952, she turned out her third novel, Whetstone Walls. This novel was a sequel to Foundation Stone, which Warren had planned as the first part of a trilogy dealing with the Whetstone (i.e., Warren) family. In Whetstone Walls, Warren's immediate family is introduced with a central character, Rob Whetstone, being based on Warren's father, Benjamin Smart Warren. Whetstone Walls marked the end of the Whetstone trilogy in published form. Though Warren continued writing until her death from cancer in 1982, she was unable to complete the third novel in the sequence. Portions of her short story drafts contain indications that they were to be used in this final novel. These drafts include "Born Patriarch," "The Frame," and "Roof in The Sky."

Warren's success with Foundation Stone was based upon her ability to picture the more typical southern family, the pioneering family, apart from the grandeur and glory of the plantation as produced in Margaret Mitchell's Gone With The Wind. Warren's writings enjoyed this ability being based, as they were, on family history. Warren made great use of autobiographical and historical materials in her works.

## Scope and Contents

The collection contains correspondence, research materials, personal items, monographs, clippings, photographs, a recording, a portrait, and drafts of Warren's novels Foundation Stone and Whetstone Walls, and of her short stories. Materials in the collection date from 1915 to 1982. The majority of Warren's correspondence covers the period from 1940 to 1942.

The collection is disappointing in terms of lack of correspondence with other literary figures of the period. Notable exceptions are letters from William Rose Benet, Peter Taylor, Alfred and Blanche Knopf, Ralph McGill (editor of the Atlanta Constitution), novelist Floyd Dell, and copies of letters from Stephen Vincent Benet and Margaret Mitchell. Of special interest are letters to and from the Knopf's, and from Alfred A. Knopf, Inc., and Appleton-Century Crofts, dealing with the publication of Foundation Stone and Whetstone Walls. Of her three husbands, only correspondence with Buel Patch appears in the files. A collection of papers of her second husband, Gerald Breckenridge, were originally included in the donation, but have been removed to form a separate collection (see the finding aid for Collection 88/5).

In terms of research materials, Warren maintained notebooks and clippings on various topics germane to her research for the Foundation Stone trilogy. A great deal of material relates to family history. Included within the research material is a genealogical chart for the Warren family, along with a genealogical chart for the fictional Whetstone family. The research materials provide an insight into the formation of chapters within Foundation Stone and Whetstone Walls.

Materials also include information relevant to Warren's writing and the publishing process during the 1940s and 1950s. Warren's interests in writing are amply documented with notebooks dating back to high school. Also included are royalty statements and information dealing with publicity tours to promote sales of books.

The greatest strength of the collection lies in the drafts of the novels Foundation Stone and Whetstone Walls, along with the short story drafts. The drafts of Foundation Stone include strong insights into Warren's personal views and life. Freudian scenes within the early drafts highlight the trends in higher education during the period of the late 'teens and early twenties. Race relations are also documented in the chapters of Warren's

novels, in some cases highly overdrawn and in others very understated.

The significance of the collection is threefold. First, it documents the life and writings of the first significant woman writer from Alabama since Augusta Evans Wilson in the late 1800's. Second, it provides a counterbalance to the grandeur of the South as presented by Margaret Mitchell in that Foundation Stone and Whetstone Walls 'are centered on a pioneer family and show how the family adjusted to a new environment. Third, the collection documents the social history of Alabama through fictionalized family history.

# Arrangement

The material is arranged into the following series:

### SERIES I. CORRESPONDENCE, 1915-1982.

Folders: 1-195. Arranged chronologically by correspondent.

The series contains correspondence between Warren, her family, friends, publishers, and a variety of fans of her novel, Foundation Stone. The majority of the correspondence falls during the years 1940 and 1941. Though lacking correspondence with many of the major literary figures of the period, the letters are valuable for judging the public reaction to the novel. Of particular interest is Warren's correspondence with Appleton-Century Crofts; Stephen Vincent Benet (a copy) William Rose Benet; novelist Floyd Dell; Alfred and Blanche Knopf; Harold Matson (her agent); Ralph McGill (editor of the Atlanta Constitution); Margaret Mitchell (a copy); Bernard Smith (her editor at Knopf); Peter Taylor; Jean Untermeyer (wife of Louis); and Irita Van Doren (wife of Carl).

#### SERIES II. PERSONAL MATERIALS.

Folders: 196-211, plus two oversized folders stored in map case drawer. Loosely arranged by time period and by type of material.

Includes invitations from the White House Warren received as a youth; report cards; clippings on marriages to Spanogle and Patch; a chronology on Warren's life prepared by her daughter; a genealogy of the Warren family; copies of family wills and reminiscences; and, a Borzoi Book dust jacket of Foundation Stone. The series lacks depth for significant research, but the chronology prepared by Warren's daughter along with the Warren family papers provides background for the setting of Foundation Stone and Whetstone Walls.

#### SERIES III. RESEARCH MATERIALS.

Folders: 212-226. Arranged by research topic.

Topics include genealogies for the Underwood, Huey, and Brooks families; notes on the history of Barbour County; a copy of "A Caravan into Alabama in the Early Thirties" by Virginia Clay; and a notebook with notes on the various characters. A part of the notes on the history of Barbour County may have been taken from an unpublished manuscript on the County's history prepared by Lewy Dorman, Professor of History at the University of Alabama.

#### SERIES IV. WRITING AND PUBLISHING.

Folders: 227-244. Arranged roughly chronologically and there under by type of material.

Includes materials relating to Warren's interest in writing, including high school journals and notebooks containing notes on short stories and poetry. Also includes publicity information from Knopf and Appleton Century-Crofts for Foundation Stone and Whetstone Walls, in addition to royalty statements for the novels. Copies of lecture notes prepared by Warren and a transcript of a radio interview are also included.

#### SERIES V. PERSONAL CLIPPINGS.

Folders: 245-258. Arranged alphabetically.

Includes clippings and articles on individuals and subjects. Included are articles on Alfred Knopf and George Washington University. A photocopy of Stephen Vincent Benet's The Beginnings of Wisdom is also included. (Note: The photocopy of The Beginnings of Wisdom was provided by Nancy Anderson in the course of her research. It was left with the collection because of its importance in understanding Benet and his influence upon Warren).

#### **SERIES VI. MISCELLANEOUS.**

Folders: 259-261. Arranged alphabetically by folder title.

Includes dust jackets for A Touch of Earth and for books published as Borzoi Books. Also includes the Borzoi Books newsletter and a packet of miscellaneous materials with items such as the pen Warren signed her first contract with. Also includes a pencil sketch of Warren, drawn by Florida artist Mary MacKinnon sometime during the 1920s, and a charcoal portrait of Warren by R. Spindler. A portion of Warren's personal library is included in the collection. The titles within the library include those of interest to Warren

and her husband. A selection of these titles have been retained in Special Collections. Others have been transferred to the Circulating Collection.

#### SERIES VII. SHORT STORIES.

Folders: 262-364.

SUB-SERIES A: UNPUBLISHED STORIES.

Folders: 262-353. Arranged alphabetically by title.

Includes drafts of short stories written by Lella Warren. Many of the stories are clearly based on the life of Warren and her family. In her drafts, Warren also displays a habit of using the same or nearly same title for two or more completely different stories. This Nettle Danger, for instance, serves as the title of both a short story and a novelette.

SUB-SERIES B: PUBLISHED STORIES.

Folders: 354-364. Arranged alphabetically by title of publication in which the articles appeared.

Consists of the published versions of Warren's short stories. Includes a serialization of Foundation Stone in <u>Omnibook Magazine</u>. For the most part, these stories appear to contain more "pure fiction" than do Warren's unpublished stories, in that they draw less upon personal history.

#### SERIES VIII. DRAFTS OF NOVELS.

Folders: 365-885.

SUB-SERIES A: SISTER GOD/FOUNDATION STONE.

Folders: 365-717, plus two boxes containing galley proofs. Arranged chronologically by draft and there under by chapter.

The arrangement to Foundation Stone is arbitrary. Warren's writing style was essentially a clip and paste approach. Sections of drafts were removed and placed in new drafts; portions were cut and pasted over other sections; page numbers were crossed over and new ones added in order to make a section fit. As a result, it has proven impossible to determine what constitutes the "first" draft. The draft has been divided into a section on the beginning of the novel under the title Sister God (the first title of the book) and then various drafts of Foundation Stone.

Decisions on the drafts were determined by story-line, by page numbering, and by print in order to provide a reasonable structure to the creation of the novel. The arrangement cannot, however, be considered absolute.

Miscellaneous pieces of the story which could not be placed precisely within the drafts have been retained following the corrected typescript, which serves essentially as the final draft. Author's proofs and galley proofs are also included, as are author's notes about revisions.

SUB-SERIES B: DAYS OF MY LIFE/WHETSTONE WALLS.

Folders: 718-752. Arranged by title and there under chronologically by chapter.

The second volume of the trilogy, Whetstone Walls, was in far better order. The volume originally began under the title Days of My Life where Warren took a strong narrative role. This was altered in Whetstone Walls, where the story evolved through the characters. Three drafts of Whetstone Walls have been identified, and proofs of the novel are also available. This volume focused on the life of Rob Whetstone (based on Lelia's father). It was to have set the stage for the third volume of the trilogy, which would have covered Rob's involvement with the establishment of the U.S. Public Health Service.

SUB-SERIES C: THIS NETTLE DANGER.

Folders: 840-885. Arranged chronologically by chapter.

This Nettle Danger was written as an interlude novel. Based on characters drawn in Foundation Stone and Whetstone Walls, it is more fictional and is not centered around the Whetstones (i.e., Warrens).

#### SERIES IX: CLIPPINGS.

Two boxes. loosely arranged.

The Clippings focus upon the novels Foundation Stone and Whetstone Walls. Included are clippings showing the place of Foundation Stone on the best-seller lists. Also included are reviews of the works and interviews with the author.

#### **SERIES X: PHOTOGRAPHS.**

Four boxes. Unarranged.

Approximately 150 photos of all types, including cartes de visites (albumen prints). Photos are included of the Warren family. Many of the photos available here were re-shot by Jerry Medley of the AUM Communications Department. Included in the photos are two showing Warren's second husband, Gerald Breckenridge.
